Anesthetics in Reptiles

- under General Considerations, p 7 Preferred reptile venipuncture sites are the ventral tail vein of lizards, ventral tail vein or heart of snakes, jugular or dorsal tail vein of chelonians and the supravertebral venous sinus of crocodylians.

- under Sedatives and Anesthetics, p 8 Ketamine combined with medetomidine: Reversible with atipamezole at 5x medetomidine $\mu\text{g}/\text{kg}$ dose (ie, equal volume)
